

# ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY COMMISSION

## Minutes

July 26, 2024

3:30 p.m.

The Livestock and Poultry Commission met on July 26, 2024, at the Hot Springs Convention Center, 134 Convention Blvd., Hot Springs, AR.

Members Present: Marcus Creasy, Tyler Davis, Bruce Maloch, Dr. Mike Pallone

Members present via Zoom: Chad Chester, Dr. William Hewat, Dr. Sara Throne, Tommy Wren, Dan Wright

Patrick Fisk, Director, Livestock and Poultry Division, and other staff members were in attendance.

Chair Davis called the meeting or order.

1. Opening comments and introductions

Chair Davis welcomed all in attendance.

2. Consider minutes of the April 10, 2024, quarterly meeting

**Moved by Maloch, seconded by Dr. Pallone to approve the minutes as presented.**

**Motion carried.**

Tanner Thomas, Attorney, Arkansas Department of Agriculture (Department), presented 3 Administrative Consent Agreements. Each respondent has signed and accepted the Consent Agreements as written.

- Dr. Brian Vandegrift was assessed a \$500 civil penalty and 8 extra hours of continuing education.
- Dr. B R Cato was assessed 4 extra hours of continuing education and recordkeeping and will submit 3 medical records per month for the next 6 months.
- Dr. Teresa Miller was assessed 7 hours of continuing education.

**Moved by Dr. Hewat, seconded by Maloch to approve the Consent Agreements as presented.**

**Motion carried.**

Thomas presented 6 Administrative Consent Agreements. These Consent Agreements have had no response or refusal to sign.

- The first veterinarian and his counsel have received the Consent Agreements with no response in reference to **Docket No. 2023-12, Docket No. 2023-13, Docket No. 2022-05, and Docket No. 2022-04.**

**Moved by Maloch, seconded by Creasy to move forward with scheduling hearing(s) on each of these matters as presented, and to authorize Fisk the authority to schedule the hearing(s) as appropriate.**

**Motion carried.**

Thomas stated this Consent Agreement was presented to the Commission at a prior meeting and requires a vote by the Commission as to their wishes. This involves the same veterinarian in a prior complaint from 2022.

**Moved by Wright, seconded by Wren to move forward with scheduling a hearing on this matter as presented, and to authorize Fisk the authority to schedule the hearing as appropriate.**

**Motion carried.**

Thomas presented **Docket No. 2022-16**. Alleged charge is for services that not been rendered. It was found by the Veterinary Medical Examining Committee (Committee) that this veterinarian charged for treatments that did not happen, or contracting services in advance that did not occur, obtaining or attempting to obtain any fee, charge, tuition, or other compensation by fraud, deception, or misrepresentation and conduct reflecting unfavorably upon the profession of veterinary medicine.

The Committee recommends 6 hours of continuing education and recordkeeping, and 1 hour in client communications.

It was proposed that this case be sent back to the Committee for further review.

**Moved by Wright, seconded by Chester to refer this case back to the Committee for further review, as proposed.**

**Motion carried.**

Thomas presented 6 veterinarian technician applications. The Committee recommends approval of the 6 applications.

**Moved by Wright, seconded by Maloch to approve the Committee's recommendation as presented.**

**Motion carried.**

Thomas presented a reciprocal licensure application for a Veterinarian Technician Kelly Ann Bloomfield, CVT.

**Moved by Wren, seconded by Creasy to approve the Committee's recommendation as presented.**

**Motion carried.**

Thomas presented a corporate application for veterinarian care of Dogwood Trails, PC. The Committee recommends approval of this application.

**Moved by Maloch, seconded by Wright to approve the Committee's recommendation as presented.**

**Motion carried.**

Thomas presented 16 reciprocal licensure applications for veterinarians. The Committee recommends approval of these applications.

**Moved by Wright, seconded by Wren to approve the Committee's recommendation as presented.**

**Motion carried.**

Thomas presented 30 state examination licensures for veterinarians. The Committee's recommends approval of these licensures.

**Moved by Wright, seconded by Wren to approve the Committee's recommendation as presented.**

**Motion carried.**

### 3. Agency reports

#### Accounting Division

Inoussa Zaki, Chief Fiscal Officer, presented the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter financial report. The Division finished with an ending operating cash balance of \$14.5 million, that is special and general revenue combined. Compared to the July 1 balance of \$13.652,000, there is a net increase of a little over \$798,000. \$12,340,000 in revenues was reported between July 1, 2023, and June 30, 2024, with expenditures totaling \$10,586,000. **Attachment 2**

**Moved by Dr. Hewit, seconded by Maloch to approve the financial report as presented.**

#### Animal Health

Dr. John Nilz presented the animal health report. Dr. Nilz stated under emergency and preparedness and response, they have a joint grant with the University of Missouri. They will be coming to Arkansas to work with some of the swine producers discussing depopulation and disposing of carcasses in the state.

Dr. Nilz discussed funding that should be released in August for the National Disease Preparedness and Response program for surveillance testing in sale barns in the market to get an idea of how widespread this new disease, Theileria, has spread within the state.

Dr. Nilz stated Arkansas Public Health and CDC are testing wastewater treatment plants, having a H5 detection. Staff will be working with them on biosecurity protocols for the waste management plants.

As of November 5<sup>th</sup>, all cattle and bison crossing state lines into Arkansas will be required to have the electronic identification tag.

Dr. Nilz stated no new cases of Trichomoniasis; continued cases of Avian metapneumovirus; HPAI H5N1 has been isolated from dairy cattle in several states; 14 Mycoplasma backyard cases since May; and the first Eastern Equine Encephalitis of the season was confirmed in July. Dr. Nilz also reported there have been 5 cases of Theileria disease in Boone County and 3 cases in Searcy County.

## Egg and Poultry Report

Cheri Ellis, Agri Division Manager, reported on general activities within the division.

Arch Farms (formerly Pet & Gerry's) has changed their name and ownership. They are having scheduled grading services 5 days a week.

Mid-State Egg, Berryville, is remodeling their facility and will have 46 packer lines at their facility. Graders will increase by 2 or 3 at that facility.

USDA AMS has published the rate increase in the Federal Register, to become effective in October 2024 for FY25, from \$6 - \$8 an hour.

School Lunch Commodities has received 2.6 million pounds of commodity contracts at different locations. They also received 328,000 of TEFAP or bonus commodities (leg quarter and breast meat products).

There have been 17 food defense audits, 3 child nutrition audits, and awarded 3 United Egg Producer audits, 3 cage free audits, 3 contractor check loading audits, and 1 label review audit; and 22 processor visits were completed.

Volume Production consisted of 442,000,000 pounds of chicken, 350,000,000 pounds of turkey, and 1.7 million cases of shell eggs.

Ellis stated they mailed out renewals for egg handler permits to 248 locations with 212 renewals received with payment confirmation.

1,000 grocery locations were inspected, 156,000 dozen cartons of product, and issued 4 warnings for failure to meet requirements.

## Laboratory Services

Dr. Sharon Pulla, Director, Veterinary Diagnostic Lab, gave a quarterly lab operations update. Dr. Pulla stated that the Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory has been working with the University of Arkansas (U of A) for the past several years to help serve the community, especially the poultry industry. As of May, the Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at the U of A is now recognized by the American Association of Laboratory accreditation as the Department's branch laboratory and has now added to our scope of accreditation. Dr. Pulla will continue overseeing their quality management.

Dr. Pulla stated they now offer 2 pseudorabies tests which gives them the ability to perform a screening test as well as a confirmatory test.

Dr. Pulla reported that Veterinarians, in addition to Global Vet Link, can now use Veterinary Services Process Streamlining to submit electronic Coggins test requests.

During the last Oaklawn horse racing season, the lab received 16 horses for necropsy. 2 were sent to Oklahoma due to limitations in storage space and incineration capabilities. Dr. Pulla said they are attempting to mitigate this challenge for the next season.

Dr. Pulla stated, for poultry necropsies, there is a two-fold increase in commercial poultry cases in the last quarter compared to the same time period of 2023. Overall poultry submissions increased by 50 percent compared to the same time last year.

### Livestock Field and Flea Markets Report

Blake Walters, Program Manager, presented field market and flea market activities and market totals for April - June 2024. The numbers are down from the same time last year. Walters stated the sale of calves has slowed down and cows are picking up at the markets.

Walters discussed Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) courses and bleeding training that was made available to staff. All training was successful.

Walters discussed the Asian Longhorned Tick and Theileria disease, making sure staff is educated and equipped to address these issues. Fact sheets have been created and placed throughout the markets and other places to include symptoms, treatments, etc.

### Meat Inspection Program

Tillman Treat, Agri Division Manager, gave an update on the Meat Inspection Program. Tillman stated a new inspector has been hired and has completed the initial training in conducting plant inspections. Currently 5 firms are participating in the program and have submitted written requests petitioning for daily inspections.

Tillman stated 2 additional facilities have joined the program bringing the total to 8 facilities participating in the program. Seven investigations have been conducted; 4 were complaints against meat processors and 3 were investigations into firms that produce products that contain meat. 87,470 pounds of beef, 17,163 pounds of pork, and 565 pounds of lamb for a total of 105,198 pounds were processed and entered in commerce this quarter.

Tillman stated the Arkansas Beef Council is currently accepting applications for research and project funding proposals. The deadline for research funding is April 22<sup>nd</sup> and project funding by April 26<sup>th</sup>.

Custom exempt reviews are ongoing.

Tillman gave the production of inspected produce for the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of the year as follows: 135,228 pounds of beef, 31,891 pounds of pork, 305 pounds of lamb, and 82 pounds goats, for of total of 168,506 pounds of produce. For the calendar year, a total of 273,704 pounds of product was produced under inspection and entered into interstate commerce. Tillman stated there will be a USDA audit in August. If the audit is successful, we will be able to begin submitting applications for Co-operative Interstate Shipment (CIS) status. Once the meat inspection program reaches the point in which USDA finds it as "equal to" their inspection program, facilities that wish to process and ship out of state will be able to under the designation of CIS.

Tillman reported on beef checkoff activities, attending livestock sales, and contacting producers to advise them on the status of the checkoff dollar.

Tillman stated staff recently attended the Summer Business Meeting in San Diego, CA, scoring several proposals for the promotion and research of beef.

The Arkansas Beef Council has several sponsored events coming up to include sponsorship of the Arkansas Naturals and Arkansas Travelers. Also, a statewide "Best Burger" competition.

#### National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP)

Kevin Simmons, NPIP Coordinator, presented the NPIP quarterly summary report of activities.

NPIP audits:

- 5 company inspections
- 13 processing plant inspections
- 4 hatchery inspections for the 2024 cycle – partial table-egg companies are up to date and current.
- 2 biosecurity audits
- All NPIP labs are up to date.

Simmons stated Pullorum-Typhoid testing was completed in May. Testing was held in Batesville, Little Rock, and Fayetteville for Commercial and Private tester schools. There were 51 commercial testers and 74 private testers of which 45 were first year attendees.

Simmons stated the Pullorum-Typhoid antigen is available through AVSBio.

Three Commercial Table Egg Layer Farms have been added to the NPIP program.

Simmons stated there are 147 small flocks certified for Subpart E participation. That's an increase of 23 participants since this same time last year.

HPAI update – 15 total flocks that have tested positive; 8 commercial and 7 backyard, for a little over 3.5 million birds depopulated in the last 30 days. For the total outbreak, 1,171 confirmed flocks, with 508 commercial and 663 backyard. 48 states have been affected by HPAI. Within the last 2 weeks, over the 100 million birds were depopulated while still picking up detections in wild birds. USDA Wildlife Service has detected HPAI in 9,555 wild birds.

### Animal Health

Dr. Nilz covered the animal health report in the absence of Dr. Josh Moffett, Field Services Manager.

#### 4. General Agency Activities

Patrick Fisk, Director, Livestock and Poultry Division covered general agency activities. Fisk stated back in the 80's and 90's, \$1 was assessed for every cow sold in Arkansas. This was under the Brucellosis Eradication Program. In 2020, the language was changed to the Bovine Disease Control Eradication Program. There has been a bill introduced in 2023 to eliminate that \$1 assessment. The bill was pulled down at that time but there are possible plans to introduce the bill once again in 2025. If passed, this would leave the industry vulnerable and result in significant staff reductions.

Fisk stated fair funding has been released. Being fully funded this time, \$1.4 million was distributed to fairs this year.

Fisk stated the Theileria disease is new to Arkansas. The disease was first found in the United States in 2017 in a cow in Virginia. Currently, with the 8 cases we have in Arkansas, with what is believed to be a 5% mortality rate, it is a low economic impact to the state at this point. Fisk stated they are communicating with USDA and neighboring states to see how they are handling the disease.

### Veterinary complaints and cases:

Dr. Pallone presented the complaints and stated the Veterinary Medical Examining Committee has reviewed the following 6 cases to be presented to the Commission for review and consideration.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (5) Incompetence, gross negligence, or other malpractice

in the practice of veterinary medicine.

Summary:

Complaint filed after Complainant had taken her parrot, Miss Hotsa Bird, to the respondent for an international health exam. A client that presented for a health certificate for a bird going to Mexico. Complainant had their health certificate denied four (4) times and the complainant came out with concern of the time, the process, information, and communication.

Recommendation:

A motion was made by Dr. Kate Williams, seconded by Dr. Rob Conner, to table the decision on Docket 2023-06 (Kathy Hole vs. Clifton Peck, DVM) until the next meeting when they have quorum and request additional medical records from Double Tree.

**Docket # 2024-01**

Allegation:

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (5) Incompetence, gross negligence, or other malpractice in the practice of veterinary medicine.

Summary:

Complaint filed after Complainant had taken his seven-month-old dog, Maxx, to the respondent for bilateral cryptorchid, so neither testicle had dropped the intention was to do surgery to find and remove those testicles. The dog was sedated that morning in front of the owner. The surgery was performed later, and the dog passed away during recovery.

Recommendation:

A motion was made by Dr. Rob Conner, seconded by Dr. Sarah Kline, and passed to recommend to the Arkansas livestock and Poultry Commission that the complaint be dismissed due to no violations of the Veterinary Medical Practice Act or rules.

**Docket # 2024-02**

Allegation:

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (5) Incompetence, gross negligence, or other malpractice in the practice of veterinary medicine.

Summary:

Complaint filed after complainant had taken her nine-week-old dog, Claus, to the respondent for a health certificate. Dr. Beach wrote a small animal interstate health paper. Dr. Beach did check for worms but found no worms at the time of the examination.

Recommendation:

A motion was made by Dr. Sarah Kline, seconded by Dr. Williams, and passed to recommend to the Arkansas livestock and Poultry Commission that the complaint be dismissed due to no violations of the Veterinary Medical Practice Act or rules.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (5) Incompetence, gross negligence, or other malpractice in the practice of veterinary medicine.

Summary:

Complaint filed after complainant had taken his dog, Chester, to the respondent for a yearly round of vaccinations.

A motion was made by Dr. Sarah Kline, seconded by Dr. Kate Williams, and passed to recommend to the Arkansas livestock and Poultry Commission that the complaint be dismissed due to no violations of the Veterinary Medical Practice Act or rules.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (5) Incompetence, gross negligence, or other malpractice in the practice of veterinary medicine.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (7) Fraud or dishonesty in the application or reporting of any test for disease in animals.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (8) Failure to maintain professional premises and equipment in a clean and sanitary condition in compliance with rules promulgated by the commission.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (10) Cruelty to animals.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (11) Unprofessional conduct by violation of a rule promulgated by the commission under this chapter.

F. For a veterinarian to undertake the care of an animal and thereafter fail to render the care as generally accepted by the veterinary profession.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (12) Being unable to practice as a veterinarian with reasonable skill and safety to patients because of illness, the use of drugs, alcohol, narcotics, or chemicals, or as a result of any mental or physical condition.

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (15) Overtreating patients or charging for services which did not occur unless the services were contracted for in advance or for services which were not rendered or documented in the patient's records or charging for services which were not consented to by the owner of the patient or the owner's agent.

Summary:

Complaint filed after Complainant had taken her dog, Rosie, to the respondent for diarrhea.

Recommendation:

A motion was made by Dr. Sarak Kline, seconded by Dr. Kate Williams, and passed to recommend this discussion be tabled with the specifics of a facility inspection and with statements based on the collaboration.

**Docket # 2024-05**

Allegation:

Ark. Code Ann. § 17-101-305 (5) Incompetence, gross negligence, or other malpractice in the practice of veterinary medicine.

Summary:

Complaint filed after Complainant had taken his dog, Chester, to the respondent for a yearly round of vaccinations.


