Tier 1 Categorical Exclusion

After appropriate environmental review, it has been determined that the subject job is a Tier 1 Categorical Exclusion as described by the ARDOT/FHWA Programmatic Agreement on Categorical Exclusion Documentation and Processing. A public hearing will not be offered for this project.

The proposed project includes construction of a sidewalk at the intersection of Highway 10 and Cedar Hill Road in Little Rock in Pulaski County. The sidewalk would be constructed on the north side of Cedar Hill Road with a minimum width of 5' and length of approximately 225'. All work would take place within the existing right of way. A project location map is attached.

The project would not involve relocations or impacts to Important Farmlands, Waters of the U.S., floodplains, underground storage tanks, hazardous materials, environmental justice populations, or cultural resources. This project has been determined to generate minimal air quality impacts for Clean Air Act criteria pollutants and has not been linked with any special mobile source air toxics concerns. The cultural resource clearance is attached. A Section 404 permit is not required.

The attached official species list obtained from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (USFWS) Information for Planning and Consultation website identified the following species as potentially occurring within the project boundaries: Tricolored Bat (*Perimyotis subflavus*), Eastern Black Rail (*Laterallus jamaicensis ssp. jamaicensis*), Piping Plover (*Charadrius melodus*), Rufa Red Knot (*Calidris canutus rufa*), Alligator Snapping Turtle (*Macrochelys temminckii*), and Monarch Butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*). This project would have "no effect" on federally listed species due to the limited scope of the action, lack of suitable habitat, and distance to known species locations.

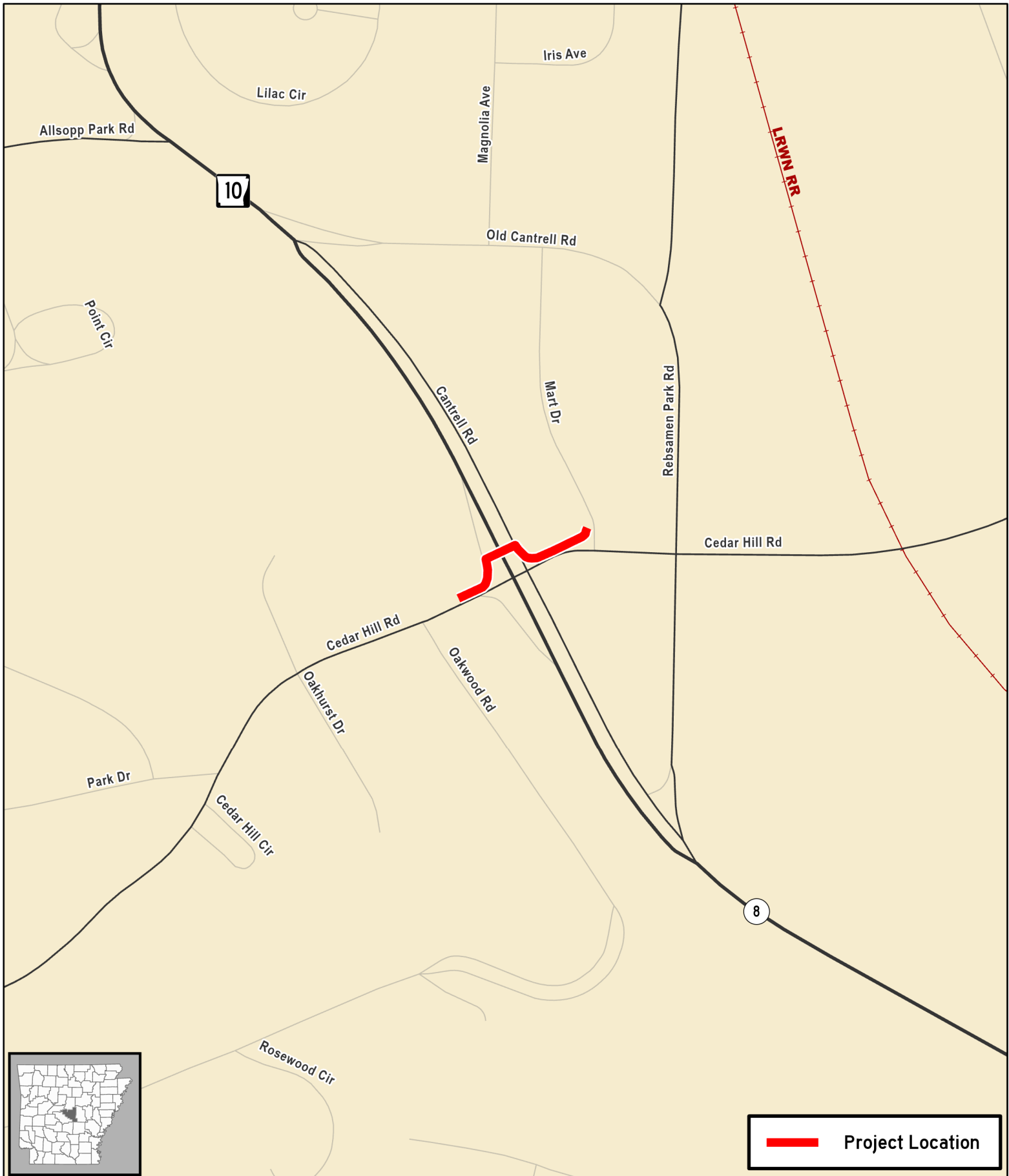
The Alligator Snapping Turtle is a proposed threatened species; the Monarch Butterfly is a candidate species; and the Tricolored Bat is a proposed endangered species. The proposed project would not jeopardize the continued existence of these species.

The project proposes for the City of Little Rock to utilize federal funds for the construction of a sidewalk in Pulaski County. The project will involve the construction of sidewalk along the north side of Cedar Hill Road at the intersection of Cedar Hill Road and Hwy. 10/Cantrell Road for a total of approximately 225 feet. The new concrete sidewalks will be a minimum of 5-feet wide. No new right-of-way (ROW) will be required.

A records check at the Arkansas Archeological Survey shows no sites in or near the project. Two historic structures (PU8855 and PU8856) were shown on the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program's structure database that are eligible or listed on the National Register of Historic Places near the project. The structures will not be impacted by this undertaking. No cultural features were shown on the 1825 GLO map. The 1936 Pulaski County Highway and Transportation map shows a few structures near the project.

The highway infrastructure, known construction practices, utilities, available plans, and aerials were examined to assess previous ground disturbance. All work will be within the existing ROW, and the current scope of the project occurs within previously disturbed areas (Highway/Street and utility construction). This type of undertaking will not affect historic properties. Therefore, this project requires no Section 106 review under Appendix B, Activity 4 of the 2024 Amended Programmatic Agreement.

To Whom It May Concern:

The species list fulfills the requirements of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) under section 7(c) of the Endangered Species Act (Act) of 1973, as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 *et seq.*).

New information based on updated surveys, changes in the abundance and distribution of species, changed habitat conditions, or other factors could change this list. Please feel free to contact us if you need more current information or assistance regarding the potential impacts to federally proposed, listed, and candidate species and federally designated and proposed critical habitat. Please note that under 50 CFR 402.12(e) of the regulations implementing section 7 of the Act, the accuracy of this species list should be verified after 90 days. This verification can be completed formally or informally as desired. The Service recommends that verification be completed by visiting the IPaC website at regular intervals during project planning and implementation for updates to species lists and information. An updated list may be requested through the IPaC system by completing the same process used to receive the enclosed list.

The purpose of the Act is to provide a means whereby threatened and endangered species and the ecosystems upon which they depend may be conserved. Under sections 7(a)(1) and 7(a)(2) of the Act and its implementing regulations (50 CFR 402 *et seq.*), Federal agencies are required to utilize their authorities to carry out programs for the conservation of threatened and endangered species and to determine whether projects may affect threatened and endangered species and/or designated critical habitat.

A Biological Assessment is required for construction projects (or other undertakings having similar physical impacts) that are major Federal actions significantly affecting the quality of the human environment as defined in the National Environmental Policy Act (42 U.S.C. 4332(2) (c)). For projects other than major construction activities, the Service suggests that a biological

evaluation similar to a Biological Assessment be prepared to determine whether the project may affect listed or proposed species and/or designated or proposed critical habitat. Recommended contents of a Biological Assessment are described at 50 CFR 402.12.

If a Federal agency determines, based on the Biological Assessment or biological evaluation, that listed species and/or designated critical habitat may be affected by the proposed project, the agency is required to consult with the Service pursuant to 50 CFR 402. In addition, the Service recommends that candidate species, proposed species and proposed critical habitat be addressed within the consultation. Migratory Birds: In addition to responsibilities to protect threatened and endangered species under the Endangered Species Act (ESA), there are additional responsibilities under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) and the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (BGEPA) to protect native birds from project-related impacts. Any activity, intentional or unintentional, resulting in take of migratory birds, including eagles, is prohibited unless otherwise permitted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (50 C.F.R. Sec. 10.12 and 16 U.S.C. Sec. 668(a)). For more information regarding these Acts see <https://www.fws.gov/program/migratory-bird-permit/what-we-do>.

The MBTA has no provision for allowing take of migratory birds that may be unintentionally killed or injured by otherwise lawful activities. It is the responsibility of the project proponent to comply with these Acts by identifying potential impacts to migratory birds and eagles within applicable NEPA documents (when there is a federal nexus) or a Bird/Eagle Conservation Plan (when there is no federal nexus). Proponents should implement conservation measures to avoid or minimize the production of project-related stressors or minimize the exposure of birds and their resources to the project-related stressors.
